


Four young Sisters led by Sr Ambrose Joseph arrived at Lochinvar in

September 1883




First home of the Sisters at Lochinvar





Died at New Town in 1948






1884: Cottage purchased on the present site. Boarders' quarters added at the back



Sisters arriving in Merriwa January 1885






Blessing the foundation stone of the first brick convent at Lochinvar1893











Network of Josephite Schools














Boarders at Aberdeen 1914




Catalyst for the move into secondary education was the Bursary Endowment Act of 1912.




